Ann. The son had also arranged for a local TV station to film the event at Drayton's house. It was also filmed on Facebook and can be found on Jay Hawkins' Facebook page. Although it was very cold outside, Drayton and Sue Ann bundled up and listened to the Rivals sing a few songs (and Drayton probably mouthed a few of the

words as well). It was a tremendous tribute to our beloved brother. After watching the video, I spoke to the District Board and gave them Drayton's mailing address that Jay Hawkins had given me in order to encourage Board members to write a card or note of encouragement to him.



Then it occurred to me that several of you who know the Justus' might like to write to Drayton and offer your words of encouragement and support in his fight against cancer. Big Chicken Delivers Valentines!



The annual Singing Valentine's project is a highlight for many barbershoppers. For many singers, it's their first opportunity to sing in a quartet. Others enjoy the camaraderie of spending the day together, bringing (often, unexpectedly) the gift of music to our customers. Still others use their logistical skills to figure out who is going where and when. But what happens when all those plans blow up because of health restrictions necessary for the safety of both the singers and the audience?

Taking a page from the books of the Barbershop Harmony Society and the Association of International Champions, the Big Chicken Chorus (Marietta, GA) decided not to let such restrictions cause a halt to our plans, but simply an adaptation of them. If we couldn't perform live, we could at least perform virtually. Under usual circumstances, our Singing Valentine's performances consist of "Let Me Call You Sweetheart" and "The Story of the Rose (Heart of My Heart)." We decided to stick with those two songs, but how could we present them in a more memorable way than just a simple video recording?

For "Let Me Call You Sweetheart," we assembled a quartet. Each of the guys' vocal parts was recorded separately, then mixed together, and finally video was added. For

"The Story of the Rose," we went a different direction. The audio was taken from a past performance of the chorus performing the song. For the video, we featured a slideshow of members of the chorus with their sweethearts – a celebration of love. Gathering these pictures was quite fun, as some guys who had been in a relationship for many years contributed pictures from days gone by – one member who has been married for over 50 years gave us a picture from when he and his wife were dating in high school! While the slideshow pictures varied for each customer, we wanted to add some more customization.

So, we gave each buyer the opportunity to add their own picture (of them and their sweetheart) to the end of the video. And whether the buyer chose to do so or not (about 75% did), the video ended with a greeting from the buyer to the recipient. An email was sent to each recipient with a link to the video on YouTube, where it will be accessible forever, as well as shareable with friends and family ("Look what Bob bought me!"). The program was a great success! We sold over 60 orders, and with the completely virtual nature, were able to fulfill orders that were hundreds of miles away. Special thanks also go to the Stone Mountain Chorus, who helped us sell orders and contributed some of the pictures for the slideshow.

REMEMBERING BOB PETERS Dixie District Treasurer 2021


CONDOLENCES - Our thoughts and prayers go out to the Family of Bob Peters, our District Treasurer, who recently passed away in February.

He also had served as Board Member and Treasurer of the Thoroughbred Chorus, Louisville, Kentucky.




PLEASE UPDATE YOUR MEMBER PROFILE IN THE MEMBER CENTER AT <u>BARBERSHOP.ORG</u>

It's been almost a year and a quarter since Voices of the South met in person.

We haven't traveled to Saint Mark United Methodist Church in Vestavia for a 7 p.m. Voices rehearsal for that long.

No singing together. No harmonizing. No camaraderie. No refreshments. No hugs. No risers. No group singing. No anything that would share Covid 19 with our best friends.

Yes! We are now singing together. For the past month we have been meeting in what we fondly call "car choir."

Voices invested in some new software and hardware, that allows us to travel to First Presbyterian Church of Alabaster to meet in our cars in their parking lot.

Once there we tune our car radios to a predetermined radio station, turn on a microphone and sing — yes, we are pretty well tuned. We can hear all four parts and the 15 to 20 of us who are lined up in cars can and do sing what Matt Powell is directing and Michael Giddens is mixing into our radios.

It isn't shoulder to shoulder on a riser, but we can hear others simultaneously singing

> our parts as if we were standing side by side.

We had met almost using the ZOOM technology. We each sang a solo in the privacy of our own homes, sitting in front of a computer. We couldn't hear each other — ZOOM doesn't sync correctly although we could, at least

weekly for more than a year see each other.

Thank goodness for new technology and a young music veep (Giddens) and director (Powell), who make the stuff work for our group.

We still wear masks when we are out of our cars. We still count the people who have had their vaccines. We talk with each other at breaks. We are a group.

Voices of the South is practicing our repertoire, so that when we can get back on stage we will be able to hit the ground running. We will sound almost as good as we did before Covid 19 changed our world.

We can see the light at the end of the tunnel! It's not an oncoming train! After pausing for two years, we're finally going to have a District Convention this fall! There will be quartet and chorus contests and all sorts of fun activities, so make your plans NOW to be in Oxford, AL this September. BIG CHICKEN DRIVE-IN REHEARSALS



The Big Chicken Chorus completed its first, full scale Drive-In Rehearsal Monday, February 1, 2021.

The attraction to Drive-In Choral Rehearsals originated during the COVID-19 pandemic when disease prevention restrictions advised people to avoid gathering in groups singing.

The COVID-19 pandemic forced many choral groups, including the Big Chicken Chorus, to revert to gathering in Zoom meetings to continue to stay current with their repertoire and to work on their vocal skills. Although this approach was in concert with the pandemic restrictions, and provided some level of camaraderie, it was entirely inadequate in terms of reproducing a consonant and synchronized choral sound. Many singers preferred to not participate in rehearsals where they could not hear the other voices.

Enter technology, as originated by the Somerset Hills Harmony in conjunction with the Hunterdon Harmonizers in July of 2020. Their setup allows the individual singer to be isolated, in compliance with all disease prevention recommendations, and hear an undelayed, consonant and synchronized sound of the other voices over the radio in their vehicle.

By using personal microphones connected to a Mixer Board, our members can participate in a Drive-In Rehearsal from the safety and protection from others that their car provides, and hear all the other participants' voices, on the car FM radio or an FM Receiver. By using the FM radio technology; there is no delay in the sound of the other voices, so the audio experience is very much like a live chorus rehearsal. Our Director, Ben McDaniel, directs from an elevated, front centered and easily visible location.

Though our first attempt was a little rough from a musical perspective, as we got accustomed to singing into microphones, hearing to all the other voices while watching the director from a car; our second rehearsal produced a sound very much like a rehearsal on the risers, some say even better than being on the risers. Our intention at present is alternate the rehearsal format between the Drive-In and Zoom. The Big Chicken Chorus is now able to rehearse and perform in a technologically enhanced and medically safe environment.
