On a frigid (by Dixie standards) Saturday in January, the **Stone Mountain Chorus** experienced another, more meaningful benefit: the joy of sharing our music with special needs kids and their families.

Focus is an Atlanta charitable organization founded in 1983 to support children with medical or developmental disabilities and their families. The Stone Mountain Chorus began its association with this charity early in its history, when the granddaughter of a director benefited from the services offered. The Chorus has maintained a close connection to Focus since that time, directing a portion of our proceeds to them, yet opportunities for more personal interactions have been limited. A recent "Family Chili Cook-off" event which included interactive music therapy afforded that opportunity. The Chorus sang at the event, and seeing the bright smiles of kids and their families as we performed was so rewarding for our singers, it was hard to tell who was benefiting more from the experience. A recent shift in our repertoire to more familiar and fun songs really helped make a connection with the audience.

While supporting a charity financially is great, there is nothing like getting out there in the community for a more direct interaction. This experience validated out commitment as a chorus to "get out there and sing"
