#### Heart of Georgia from Warner Robins, GA by Bob Smith

The **Heart of Georgia Barbershop Chorus** recently entertained participants at a blood drive in memory of **George Grace** at Christ United Methodist Church in Warner Robins, GA. George was a long-time member of the Heart of Georgia Chorus before his passing from cancer in his forties. He served as assistant director for many of those years and was often the MC at our shows. **Don Schall**, our chorus president (pictured) and George were in a quartet for many years as well. Don said George had perfect pitch, which was a godsend on those rare days when someone else forgot their pitch-pipe. In fact the quartet never carried a pipe to gigs. George, a civilian engineer on Robins Air Force Base, was a choir director most of his adult life, as well as a member of the Macon Symphony (sousaphone), the Renaissance Singers in Macon, and a regular performer with the Macon Little Theater. As a singer, musician, and especially as a friend, he is sorely missed.

The blood drive attained a new high of 76 good units of blood and saved up to 228 lives. Red Cross Coordinator Ed Lee thanked the blood drive team and all the donors who helped to accomplish this level and added, "We also were serenaded by the Heart of Georgia Barbershop Chorus for the last

half of the drive which 'with the pizza (provided by the church) - amounted to dinner and a show!'"

Our chorus also visited the Houston County Rehabilitation Center and spread some Christmas cheer to the residents. I loved it when I could see folks singing and tapping their toes. We also had a couple of elves who gave early Christmas presents to the residents and staff.

The audience response to each musical group should be amazing, especially when all the groups come together for a finale of a special **Clay Hine** arrangement of Let There Be Peace on Earth and Christmas is For the Children but the unquestioned highlight of the evening should be the very special Night Before Christmas segment read by kids from Cure Childhood Cancer. There won't be a dry eye in the house as those very special kids remind everyone present of the meaning of Christmas.

### Anderson Electric City Chorus from Anderson, SC by John Yane

During the weekend of November 6-8, 2009, people of Anderson County, South Carolina showed how much fun can be shared when volunteers are involved. Organizers of the first-ever Balloons Over Anderson festival wanted this event to be put on by the community, for the community. Based on the turnout and the smiles I saw on the faces of spectators and volunteers, the balloon festival was a success.

26 hot air balloons and their dedicated teams were the center of attention. The mass launches were breath-taking. Visitors lined up for tethered balloon rides and helicopter rides.

Between balloon events, a squadron of radio-controlled planes rose from the grassy field and garnered more than a few oohs and aahs from spectators with their acrobatic stunts and low-level, high-speed passes.

And of course, entertainment filled the gaps. **The Electric City Harmonizers** (the Anderson, SC chapter of the BHS), jumped at

this opportunity. Our old-fashioned barbershop style music seemed an ideal fit for the balloon festival.

Singing outdoors is never easy; wind complicates things. We decided to form a small circle around the microphones. This was the only way we could hear each other. Folks gathered all around the small stage; it was "Theatre In The Round" with our faces to each other (and to the microphones) and with our backs to the audience. 

### The Original "Pay-It-Forward..." by Sandy Sanders

My Dad was a very unique man. He was a World War II veteran, an artillery "Scout Pilot" with the "101st Airborne Division" (in the Vietnam War, we called them "Forward Air Controllers" because they called in air strikes on the enemy). He was nominated for the "Purple Heart" and the "Bronze Star", but declined them both. He was a "captain" of industry, a leader in the community, a Deacon in his church, and he was my hero and mentor. He was also a damned good Barbershopper!

He sang in a quartet up in east Tennessee for 35+ years, **Class of '42**, was a member of the **Appalachian Express Chorus** for many years, introduced me to barbershopping, and loved nothing better than sitting around teaching and singing tags! I actually got to sing with him while we marched together with the "Big Orange Chorus" in the ABC Disney Easter Day Parade at Disney World. He passed away in 2005.

Now to the purpose of this story... It's the Christmas Holiday Season, bordered by Thanksgiving on the front and New Year's Eve on the rear, and as the song says: "...It's that time of year when the world falls in love..." So, I thought I would share with you a little known fact about my Dad. He was a giver. He gave of himself in so many ways. His favorite barbershop Christmas song was Jim Clancy's arrangement of "The Secret of Christmas." Dad used to say, "Just listen to the words of that song; it will tell you how to live your life!" And that's how he lived his!

He used to tell my brother and me, "If you really want to have some fun, do something really, really nice for someone and never tell them, or anyone else, that it was you who did it; it will be just between you and the good Lord! Then watch them go crazy trying to figure out who did this "good deed!!" I never truly realized what he meant until a stranger named Keith walked up to me, in the reception line at Dad's memorial service, and told me that he was there to pay tribute to Dad because Dad had mentored him in high school, encouraged him to get good grades, and then had put him through college in Metallurgical Engineering at the University of Tennessee; all on a "handshake!"

After Keith graduated and was married, he went to pay Dad back the total amount of the college loan five years later. Dad told him he'd either take the funds and conclude the deal, or Keith could put 15% additional moneys to the amount and find another "deserving youth" that he could then put through college! Keith said he and his wife thought about it and immediately decided to keep the money "in play." He then told me that a girl at East Tennessee State University was graduating that next quarter after utilizing Keith and Dad's funds! The most remarkable thing about this was that Keith's final comment to me was that Dad let it "slip" to him that Keith was the 6th kid he had put through college!! When I asked Mom about this, she only knew of one student that Dad (and she) had done this for and was astonished to learn there were 5 more!

The morale to this story, and one I live by, is to always strive to "give something back." And since it "tis the season," it just seems like the perfect time for all of us who love barbershopping to "give something back" to our friends, neighbors, community, etc. Don't pass up the chance to sing for someone this holiday season; you'll never know what "gift" you may be giving?!
